He carried our sin to the cross so that we could live with him forever. Let us humble ourselves, therefore, before our God and confess our sins to him, so that we can be assured of his forgiving love in Christ.

C Holy and merciful Father, I confess that I am by nature sinful, and that I have disobeyed you in my thoughts, words, and actions. I have done what is evil and failed to do what is good. For this I deserve your punishment both now and in eternity. But I am truly sorry for my sins, and trusting in my Savior, Jesus Christ, I pray: Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner.

A TEENAGER MODELS MATURE FAITH

- I. Think back to your teenage years. Give an example of an important, adult-like act you did or decision you made that had a real impact on you and/or others. At the time, how did you feel about what you did? How do you look at it now? How did people around you at the time feel about what you did?
- 2. Read Luke 1:26-56.
 - What were Mary and her family's very exciting plans for her life?
 - Were these plans godly and good? Explain.
 - What was God's very exciting plan for Mary's life?
 - How would God's plan change/impact Mary's life?
 - How could Mary have reacted to this divine change of plan?
 - How does the way she did react provide a great faith-model for us?
- 3. Re-read Luke 1:37. Some translations show this verse as, "Nothing is impossible with God."
 - Why would the point of these words (no matter which translation is used) bring such comfort to Mary amid the good, bad, ugly, and unbelievable that would have surrounded her pregnancy?
 - Why might the words of Jeremiah 29:11 have been recalled by Mary and rejoiced over during this period in her life?
 - How does Jeremiah 29:11 relate to all mankind through what Mary was birthing into the world?
 - How would Jeremiah 29:11 and Luke 1:37 bring Mary comfort 32 or so years from her teens?
 - When have the words of these two Scripture passages brought comfort to you amid the good, bad, ugly, and unbelievable in your life?
- **4.** Re-read Luke 1:46-55. In these verses, Mary glorifies (which means magnifies and makes large) her God in all his love, grace, and power.
 - What specific magnifying remarks does Mary make?
 - Which remark from a sinful Mary is the most magnifying?
 - How do you "make large" your God?
 - How do you sometimes make him small?
 - REACT: The bigger God is to you, the more peace and joy you will find in your life.
- **5.** Mary, a teenager, was given a great assignment by God. How could we use the story of Mary to motivate believing teenagers we know? How might I Timothy 4:12 also help?
- PRAY Christ the Lord to us is born, Alleluia! On this joyous Christmas morn, Alleluia! Of a virgin lowly, He, the King most holy. Born this day to save us. Prophesied in days of old, Alleluia! Next Steps

- God's Plans Not My Plans. Review Joseph's story (Genesis 39-50). What door is God asking you to walk through that you're not sure you want to walk through? Try to imagine what God's plan might be. Ask God for the wisdom and strength to walk through that door.
- My Life Is Not My Own. Think about what that phrase means. What would change if you lived every day as if your life were not your own? Pick one thing that comes to mind and make the change.
- How Big Is My God? There are many believers who have experienced how big God really is (Abraham, Daniel, the three men in the fiery furnace). Think of something "big" that God can do in your life or the life of someone you know and pray boldly for it!
- When You See It. Mary held the fulfillment of God's amazing promise in her arms. Praise God for something amazing that he has done in your life.
