





We at St. Paul's want everyone to enjoy this fellowship meal. However, we cannot ask someone to express agreement with us until we give that person an opportunity to discover what we teach. COSTA MAYA MINISTRIES

In August 2007, Hurricane Dean, a category 5 storm, struck Mahahual, Mexico, an underdeveloped and relatively new frontier area in the Yucatan Peninsula. It nearly destroyed the home of Lynn and Jerry Zimpelmann, seasonal residents from Wisconsin. In retrospect we can see how the Lord used that storm to bless His Church and His people.

The Holy Spirit at Work

Because of the storm, Deb and Hugh Blackburn became on-site caretakers for the Zimpelmanns' property. Deb, not a Christian at the time, joined the Zimpelmanns in their daily worship and fellowship. The Holy Spirit began working in her heart and she continued fervently in God's Word after Lynn and Jerry departed for the States. The Spirit then sustained Deb in her new faith walk while she studied--virtually alone. As she grew spiritually and tried to share her faith, it became



apparent that Mahahual might be a place to plant a mission.

While Wisconsin Synod officials were excited about starting a new mission, they could offer no monetary support. Nevertheless, a small core of praying believers decided to go forward. They named their effort *Costa Maya Ministries*, recognizing their mission dreams were more than to serve Mahahual, but the entire Costa Maya region. Over the years, a network of congregations and individuals have become mission partners with Costa Maya Ministries.

Mission Partner & Mission Trip Opportunities

Pastor Martin Valleskey, who recently served in the Milwaukee area at Christ-St. Peter's, now serves this mission outpost. In the fall of 2017, he and Jerry Zimplemann invited St. Paul's to become a mission partner. This mission partner relationship will not only provide financial support, but also give St. Paul's members an opportunity to get involved personally in a third-world mission effort. Mahahual is just a few hours south of Cancun. Short-term mission teams can fly into Cancun quite inexpensively, provide assistance over a weekend of ministry in Mahahual, and return home all in a "long weekend."

A son of our congregation and former teacher in our school, Dan Thiel, joined this mission effort in December for a one-year volunteer position. It is our prayer that this personal connection can blossom as we give special gifts to support Costa Maya Ministries as our "Mexican Mission Partner" and help us organize mission trips to show Christian love in person to the people of Mahahual.



Bible Study Discussion Starters based on today's message

Life application materials for us in Connector Groups, home devotions, and other small groups.

- 1. Share highs and lows with your group and begin your time together in prayer.
- 2. This week's message title is "Love Takes Up the Cross." What does that mean to you?
- 3. Read Mark 8:31-38.
 - a. What do you suppose Peter's rebuke in v. 32 might have sounded like?
 - b. If you were Peter, what might you have said in response to Jesus' words in v. 33?
 - c. How would you explain Jesus' words in v. 34-38 to a child in first or second grade?
- 4. In Philippians 2:6-8 we're reminded that Jesus took up the cross of becoming human and experiencing our every pain, temptation, and toil. Can you think of a specific account from Jesus' life here on earth that affirms he has experienced one of *your personal struggles*?
- 5. Take one or two minutes of silence to think of a time that you intentionally tried to (or successfully did) fulfill Jesus' words in Mark 8:34-38. Share that experience with your group.
- 6. What does "love takes up the cross" mean when we consider applying that principle to our family, friends, and neighbors?
