- 1. Start your time together by sharing your highs and lows from the past week and praying together.
- 2. Have you ever experienced an injustice in your life? What kind of reaction did you have in that moment? Did your reaction change once you had time to reflect on it more?
- 3. Read I Peter 3:23. How does Jesus' handling of injustice "inform" our handling of the same? When would or should a Christian handle injustice in a proactive way? (Matthew 22:39 is helpful) What factor(s) determines how we handle injustice "in the moment"?
- 4. When we talk about Jesus' life and, more specifically his death, we can't ignore the topic of injustice. Which part(s) of Jesus' trial (Luke 22:66-23:25) seem the most back-handed or unjust?
- 5. What might the headlines or social media feeds look and sound like if Jesus' trial happened in our world today?
- 6. Take a moment to reflect on the fact that everything Jesus experienced in this trial was supposed to be *our* punishment to bear. What kinds of thoughts, emotions or words come to mind when you consider this? (Guilt? Awe? Reassurance? Sadness? Gratitude?)
- 7. Read Matthew 5:1-12 and Mark 10:45. This is Jesus' brand of justice. What can you say or do in your day-to-day life this following week that reflects this kind of justice in the face of a world filled with injustice?
