- M Brothers and sisters in Christ, the apostle John exhorts all believers to love one another, for love comes from God. He says: "Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God.

- ²¹Leaving that place, Jesus withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. ²² A Canaanite woman from that vicinity came to him, crying out, "Lord, Son of David, have mercy on me! My daughter is demon-possessed and suffering terribly."
- ²³ Jesus did not answer a word. So his disciples came to him and urged him, "Send her away, for she keeps crying out after us."
- ²⁴He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel."
- ²⁵ The woman came and knelt before him. "Lord, help me!" she said.
- ²⁶He replied, "It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs."
- ²⁷ "Yes it is, Lord," she said. "Even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table."
- ²⁸ Then Jesus said to her, "Woman, you have great faith! Your request is granted." And her daughter was healed at that moment.

SERMON Romans 14-15:13

Pastor Nate Strobel

Accept the one whose faith is weak, without quarreling over disputable matters. ²One person's faith allows them to eat anything, but another, whose faith is weak, eats only vegetables. ³The one who eats everything must not treat with contempt the one who does not, and the one who does not eat everything must not judge the one who does, for God has accepted them. ⁴Who are you to judge someone else's servant? To their own master, servants stand or fall. And they will stand, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

⁵One person considers one day more sacred than another; another considers every day alike. Each of them should be fully convinced in their own mind. ⁶Whoever regards one day as special does so to the Lord. Whoever eats meat does so to the Lord, for they give thanks to God; and whoever abstains does so to the Lord and gives thanks to God. ⁷For none of us lives for ourselves alone, and none of us dies for ourselves alone. ⁸If we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord. So, whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord. ⁹For this very reason, Christ died and returned to life so that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living.

¹⁰ You, then, why do you judge your brother or sister? Or why do you treat them with contempt? For we will all stand before God's judgment seat. ¹¹ It is written:

"'As surely as I live,' says the Lord,
'every knee will bow before me;
every tongue will acknowledge God.'"

12 So then, each of us will give an account of ourselves to God.

¹³ Therefore let us stop passing judgment on one another. Instead, make up your mind not to put any stumbling block or obstacle in the way of a brother or sister. ¹⁴ I am convinced, being fully persuaded in the Lord Jesus, that nothing is unclean in itself. But if anyone regards something as unclean, then for that person it is unclean. ¹⁵ If your brother or sister is distressed because of what you eat, you are no longer acting in love. Do not by your eating destroy someone for whom Christ died. ¹⁶ Therefore do not let what you know is good be spoken of as evil. ¹⁷ For the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking, but of righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Spirit, ¹⁸ because anyone who serves Christ in this way is pleasing to God and receives human approval.

¹⁹Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification. ²⁰Do not destroy the work of God for the sake of food. All food is clean, but it is wrong for a person to eat anything that causes someone else to stumble. ²¹It is better not to eat meat or drink wine or to do anything else that will cause your brother or sister to fall.

²²So whatever you believe about these things keep between yourself and God. Blessed is the one who does not condemn himself by what he approves. ²³But whoever has doubts is condemned if they eat, because their eating is not from faith; and everything that does not come from faith is sin.

15 We who are strong ought to bear with the failings of the weak and not to please ourselves. ² Each of us should please our neighbors for their good, to build them up. ³ For even Christ did not please himself but, as it is written: "The insults of those who insult you have fallen on me." ⁴ For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement they provide we might have hope.

⁵ May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you the same attitude of mind toward each other that Christ Jesus had, ⁶ so that with one mind and one voice you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

⁷ Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God. ⁸ For I tell you that Christ has become a servant of the Jews^[e] on behalf of God's truth, so that the promises made to the patriarchs might be confirmed ⁹ and, moreover, that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written:

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"Therefore I will praise you among the Gentiles;
I will sing the praises of your name."

10 Again, it says,

"Rejoice, you Gentiles, with his people."

11 And again,

"Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles;
let all the peoples extol him."

12 And again, Isaiah says,
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"The Root of Jesse will spring up, one who will arise to rule over the nations; in him the Gentiles will hope."

¹³May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

WORSHIP PLANS FOR THE NEXT COUPLE OF MONTHS

The Ministerial Team continues to evaluate the best way to serve our congregation with Word and Sacraments during the COVID pandemic. We will be implementing the following changes:

1. Traditional Service Livestreamed Sundays at 9:15 am beginning September 13

Beginning the weekend of September 13, we will livestream the 9:15 am Traditional Service as well as the 10:15 am Bridge Service. Our online congregation will be able to hear the congregational responses and join together in simultaneous worship. We will be able to make the service interactive by inviting immediate feedback on Facebook. A livestreamed service also provides for a more prominent placement on social media. Those worshipping at 9:15 will see extra camera equipment on the sides of the sanctuary, but otherwise the service will continue as normal.

The livestreamed service will be available for playback almost immediately. It will remain available for online worship for a week until replaced by the following Sunday's worship. The messages will then be added to our online message library.

A drawback is that those accustomed to viewing the new worship service on Saturday will not be able to do so. We pray that you will be able to adjust to a new worship schedule as we seek to develop an online ministry that can be sustained by our team for months to come.

2. Overflow Seating at 9:15 am service

Because the 9:15 service will be livestreamed, we will be able to livestream the service into the Grace Room and other areas on campus as needed to expand our seating capacity while still providing for adequate social distancing.

3. Confirmation Services on September 13

Our youth confirmation services will be held on Sunday, September 13 at 1:30 and 3:00. Attendance is by invitation only. Both services will be livestreamed on Facebook and YouTube.

4. Outdoor Worship on September 20

We will offer another outdoor worship opportunity on Sunday, September 20th at 10:30 in place of The Bridge and 10:45 services. This past week, over 300 people gathered for worship under the trees. It may be possible that we will offer one more outdoor service in October if the long-range weather forecast looks promising.

5. Small Group Communion

We will continue to offer small group communion twice per month. However, because of the overflow seating in the Grace Room, small group communion will be offered in the sanctuary after the Saturday 5 pm and Wednesday 7 pm services and on Wednesdays from 10 am until noon beginning the weekend of September 20. - 4. Further Study: Read I Corinthians 10:23-11:1 for another practical application on "disputable matters". The weight of the dilemma can be gleaned from the section preceding entitled, "Idol Feasts and the Lord's Supper".
- 5. Proceed with Prayer? Have a heartfelt conversation about "Black Lives Matter" and the current state of our nation. Pool your knowledge from God's Word and from the news about "One Race; One Blood" and the issues fracturing our communities. How does Noah impact our view of ALL human life? How does John 3:16 and the works of the Savior inform our hearts on how to truly love all people?
- 6. As a group, create a list of current news items to pray about. Use the prayer outline of the ACTS of prayer—Adoration (You are awesome, God!), Confession (Forgive me, Lord) THANKSgiving and Supplication (Please, Lord...) to bend God's ear, to warm his heart, to seek his forgiveness, to find his wisdom.
- 7. Can you sing the Doxology to close your time together? :-)

Praise God from whom all blessings flow. Praise him all creatures here below. Praise him above, ye heavenly hosts. Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Amen.
