The Tree of Life

Tenebrae, which is a Latin word meaning "shadows," has been observed in the church of Jesus Christ since the fourth century. On this Good Friday we marvel that the Creator of life died on a tree so that through his death we might partake of the Tree of Life forever. As we connect the seven days of creation to the seven days of Holy Week, we will extinguish the candles on the Communion table, one by one. The gradual extinguishing of the candles will be accompanied by short reflections, prayers, hymns, choral anthems, and readings from Scripture. Near the end of the service, the Christ Candle will be removed briefly from the sanctuary to signify Christ's death. After a moment of silence, the Christ Candle will be brought back as a foretaste of the resurrection hope that we will celebrate on Easter.

It Is Finished

Then the Lord God formed a man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being (Genesis 2:7).

Mark 15:33-39, Bible page 1022

Darkness fills the sanctuary.

THE REMOVAL OF THE CHRIST CANDLE

STREPITUS

A Latin word meaning "loud noise," symbolizing the earthquake that occurred when Jesus died and the closing of the Savior's tomb.

A moment for silent meditation.

PRAYER

- M We pray.
- C O Lord Jesus Christ, you resolved to do your Father's work and finish it. Give us your strength that morning and evening we live in hope, knowing that your great work for us is completed. Amen.

THE SEVENTH DAY The Day of Rest *By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the seventh day he rested from all his work (Genesis 2:2).*

REFLECTION

Mark 15:42-47, Bible page 1022

HYMN 754

Rest, O Christ, From All Your Labor

Rest, O Christ, from all your labor; Sleep within your borrowed tomb. Foes have crucified and bound you Fast within death's narrow room. Pilate's guards stand watching, waiting Where they rolled the sealing stone. All unseen another watches: God will not forsake his own.

Peace at last from all your anguish, Wounds in hand and feet and side. Enemies no longer mock you, Scourged, abandoned, crucified. Faithful women gather spices, Weep for you whom sin has slain. Though they mourn, the God who guards you Will not let your death be vain.

Help us keep this solemn Sabbath As we wait for Easter dawn. Earth's dark night of sin is passing; Death's long reign will soon be gone. Christ, in whom the new creation Rises brighter than the sun: May we, as we watch for morning, Trust the vict'ry you have won. M Now all is silent. The hellish crew, death, and the grave have had their day. Yet they shall not have the last word. The Temple they sought to destroy will rise up again on the third day. In confident hope and expectation, the church awaits the glory of the Easter morn.

The Christ Candle is restored representing the resurrection hope that is ours and will be celebrated on Easter morning.

- M My body also will rest secure (*Psalm 16:9*),
- C because you will not abandon me to the grave, nor will you let your Holy One see decay (*Psalm 16:10*).

THE LORD'S PRAYER (whispered)

- M We pray.
- C Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.

After a moment of meditation, the congregation is asked to leave in silence.

We encourage you to go home today anticipating the joys of Easter while contemplating the solemnity of Good Friday. You may remain in the sanctuary for meditation or prayer as long as you like. The omission of the benediction today indicates that our worship is not complete until joined with the celebration of Easter.
